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## Director's corner

**You've just made an insufficient bid - so you can just make it sufficient and carry on, right?**

### **WRONG**

Offender's left hand opponent must be given the option of accepting the insufficient bid.

Say North opens 1S, and East bids 1H (thinking the opening bid is 1C). South might like to accept the insufficient bid, and continue with 1NT, or 2C, or 2D, bids which can't be made if East changes the overcall to 2H.

Many experienced players think they know the rules, but sometimes there are options and nuances which are not apparent. This is why you should *Call the Director!*

Do you know the difference between a major and minor penalty card?

Or the lead restrictions which might be applied when a defender has a penalty card?

Or what your options are after a late alert?

When something goes wrong - *Call the Director* - if you don't you may turn a minor mistake into a real mess.

### **How to save a few seconds**

It can be hard to keep to time, and no-one wants the Director hovering over the table asking you to play quickly. So saving a few seconds here and there can help.

Do you keep a personal score card? And you are on lead? Make your lead first, and then write up your score card while dummy is being tabled.

Are you South, looking after the BridgePad? Enter the contract and declarer while the opening leader is deciding what to lead, and dummy is being tabled. Oh, you are on lead? Lead first, then turn to the BridgePad.

Sure, it only makes a few seconds difference, but those few seconds can make the evening run a lot more smoothly.

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## In the news: YEH Online Bridge World Cup

31 October – 2 November 2016

This Mixed Teams event was the first live online Bridge Show, featuring the greatest champions and biggest personalities associated with the game.

Team *Europe-Lavazza* (in Turin, at the headquarters of Lavazza) included the women who currently hold the top two positions in the world rankings, Sylvie Willard and Benedicte Cronier, alongside Maria Teresa Lavazza, Norberto Bocchi, Giorgio Duboin, Agustin Madala.

Team *USA-BBO* (in Seattle) was Bob Hamman (the all-time number 1 in the world rankings) playing with Jill Meyers (number 2 on the all-time women's list) Fred Gitelman & Sheri Winestock, and Bill Gates and Sharon Osberg.

Team *CCBA* (in Beijing) comprised Mr Zeng Peiyan, former vice premier for economy & General secretary of the Asian Economic Forum, Mr Guo Jinlong, former Mayor of Beijing, and Chinese World Champions: Gu Ling, Sun Shaolin, Zhang Bangxiang, Li Jianwei.

Team *Chen Yeh* (also in Beijing) included Mr Chen Yeh, joined by World Champions: Shih Juei-Yu, Chen Dawei, Sun Ming, Zhang Yanlan, Wang Ping.

At each venue, remotely controlled webcams monitored each player, streaming live images across the Internet.

After three thrilling days of around the clock play it was Lavazza who emerged triumphant
