Survey – Response to ideas put forward on the starting and finishing time of evening sessions

Your Club Director, Margaret Robertson, has this response on the suggestions received from the survey on session start and finish times, and scheduling extra playing sessions.

Starting and finishing times for evening sessions

There were a number of comments received regarding the starting and finishing times of our current evening sessions, some wanting to start playing bridge at 7:00pm so that the session would finish at around 10:00pm. Starting at 7:00pm would also mean that players would need to be at bridge, seated and ready to play by 6:50pm.

While this suggestion has merits, there is one major drawback and that relates to getting directors. Directors usually arrive up to 30 mins before the session begins, so if all the evening sessions were to start at 7:00pm, the directors would need to arrive at or around 6.30pm. On Thursday nights we use Directors from outside our club, who live in the wider Wellington region and feedback is that they would find it difficult to get to the clubrooms by 6:30pm. Three of our club directors who work in Wellington City have said that they would struggle to get to the Club by 6.30 pm. Others who don't work have also made the same comment. So, starting at 7:00pm rather than 7:30pm would cause directing issues.

I also note that some of our members who work in the City can struggle to get to bridge by 7:20pm. They would not be able to play if they had to be at bridge by 6:50pm.

If members would like to finish earlier, then there are several things that could be looked at:

- 1. All club members need to be at bridge, seated and ready to play 10mins before the session starts (see page 5 of 2023 Programme Book). The director needs to set up the computer in the knowledge of how many are playing. A delay in players arriving (so after 7.20 pm) will inevitably flow onto a delay in the session starting.
- 2. Players do not stop and discuss a board after it has been played (or at least limit that discussion) this takes up playing time. On Tuesday & Thursday nights players are given 6 minutes to play each board at a table plus one minute to move between tables. It is East's responsibility to sign off the bridge tab, and it is West's responsibility to promptly move to the next table.
- **3. Limit the number of boards played in a session.** Perhaps 20-22 on a Wednesday, and 24-26 on a Tuesday.

4. Trial starting slightly earlier one night a week, say at 7:15 – possibly on a Wednesday night. This would mean club members playing on Wednesdays would need to be seated by 7.05pm for the Director to set up the room.

Playing Sessions

There were several comments received about playing on Monday nights, Friday nights and Sunday afternoons.

We traditionally hold lessons, both learner & improver lessons, on a Monday night. We couldn't run a bridge session as well as lessons at the same time, - we simply don't have room.

The majority of the tournaments held in the greater Wellington area are held on a Sunday, so Sunday play would impact on our members who like to play in the regional tournaments.

Social bridge on Friday nights may have some merit, however it would require someone to volunteer to be responsible for running the evening. If you would be interested in running Friday evening sessions, please let Margaret know.

To finish on an informative note

Today's Bridge evolved from earlier games such as Whist which dates back to the 16th century. The story goes that whist players, unwilling to forgo their game merely because there were only three available players, played a game called "dummy" (with one hand exposed).

While the origin of bridge is not definitely known, a similar game appeared in Constantinople before 1870, under the name khedive, and almost the same game had been played in Greece before that. Khedive, whose name had for some reason become biritch, was played on the French Riviera in the 1870s. A pamphlet titled Biritch; or, Russian Whist, was issued in London in 1887 and very nearly described bridge whist. The game's name is an Anglicization of the word biritch.
